The mission of the San Francisco Wellness Initiative is to improve the health, well-being, and educational outcomes of SFUSD high school students.


Total Number of Youth Served	<b>310</b> (unduplicated) <b>49</b> % of the student population (639 in 2016-17)
Total Number of Service Hours	<b>2,282 hours</b> (an average of 7.4 hours per student)
Student Drop-Ins	<b>39 students</b> visited the Wellness Program during drop-in hours on a typical day. Over the entire school year, that equals <b>6,894 student contacts</b> .



Wellness provided 84 health promotion activities reaching 10,190 students (duplicated), including:


